I NEED ADMISSION

Do you need study admission to Germany? But before you apply you need to understand why you want to study in Germany. I had to find out why Germany was a top choice for me and why it stood out from other countries as a beloved study destination in Europe.

Unique culture and history of Germany and as well explore its beautiful landscape. Germany has more 410 higher education institutions and gives you the possibility to choose close to 15,000 Bachelor and master study programmes.



11 states in Germany charge no tuition fees at all for international students, except for some states like Baden Württemberg that now charges tuition.

It is not so expensive to study and live in Germany. The average living cost is a ro u n d 80 0 - 9 0 0€ E u ro i n c l u d i ng accommodation, food, transport, health insurance, telephone/internet, study materials and fun activities.

DAAD (German Academic Exchange Service) and many other foundations both public and private foundations offer scholarship opportunities to foreign students.

INFORMATION YOU NEED TO KNOW ABOUT THE HIGHER EDUCATION SYSTEM IN GERMANY

I was surprised to discover the variety of higher institutions, study programmes and degrees available in Germany. There are more than 420 higher institutions, among which 106 are universities in Germany offering more than 18,200 study programmes for both German and international students. Germany has many renowned Universities, some ranking among the top 100 Universities in the world. Universities Ranking (https://www.webometrics.info/en/Europe/Germany%20#content)

Germany has a unique system of higher education. No matter what your needs or talents are, you'll certainly find an institution to fit into in Germany.

You typically have the choice among the following:

- 1. Universities: scientific-research focused.
- 2. Universities of Applied Sciences mainly focused on technical and professional practices, usually offering several internship opportunities during studies or after studies.
- 3. Colleges of art, dance, fashion, film and music, etc. are focused on those who are talented and passionate about creativity, entertainment and self-expression.



Though, I applied for a Bachelor's programme, but it was interesting to find out that Germany offers study programmes at all levels:



- **1. Undergraduate studies:** Bachelor's degree (BA, BSc, BSEng): This usually takes up 6-8 semester to complete, that is between 3 to 4 years, and you are awarded 180 up to 240 ECTS (European Credits Transfer System)
- 2. International Exchange Programmes students often spend one semester in abroad in another country to study in an international institution or University. This is usually done to complement students' study or for them to gain exposure in their respective field elsewhere. This could be applicable to either bachelor's or master's students.
- **3. Graduate Studies:** Master's degree (MA, MSc, MEng): This takes usually 2-4 semester to complete, that is 1 to 2 years, you must earn between 60 to 120 ECTS Credits
- **4. PhD/Postgraduate Studies:** PhD Degree: You only need 4-10 semester to complete your research work (dissertation) to earn a doctorate degree in Germany

ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS:

There are no general admission requirement to study in Germany, it depends on your choice of study programme and level as well as study institution and this varies from institution to institution and course of study to course of study. In most cases if you are going for a bachelor's degree, like in my case, my school-leaving certificate from Nigeria was not enough to present for admission in Germany and my German was not very good, so I had to apply for 1-year foundation programme called 'Studienkolleg' and then I wrote and passed the qualification assessment exam called Feststellungsprüfung. This enabled me to start my actual course of study.

But I had a friend, Ojolo, who was from Uganda, who was talented in art and design, did not have to take an entrance exam like me, instead he wrote an aptitude test and submitted his work samples to the school.



LANGUAGE PROFICIENCY AND REQUIREMENT FOR ADMISSION:

ÿ Most undergraduate courses in Germany are taught in German, while many graduate courses are currently available in English. If your course of study is in German, you'll need to show evidence of German language. To meet these requirements, you ought to have one of the following exams: German Language Test for Admission of Foreign Study Applicants or TestDaF. You don't need to take the German language test if you have these alternatives, i.e. an Abitur from a German school or you have the German Language Diploma (Level II), Goethe Zertifikat C1 or C2. Although there are some Universities that don't require international students to have the knowledge of German, but this is mostly for Master courses; in which case some Universities may request that you show a proof of English language, requiring TOEFL or IELTS. As a foreign student, if you would like to have an idea about your ranking in comparison to other applicants who wants to study in Germany, you can take an aptitude test called TestAS. Here is a link for you: https://www.testas.de/en/index en.htm If you have a good results, you can increase your chances of being admitted for studies in a University in Germany.



ACADEMIC STRUCTURE AND REQUIREMENT:

Academic structure is different depending on the University and degree in Germany. In Germany every course of study is overseen by a seminar. This maybe in another building or in the same building. You'll also find the professors and research assistants here. Every course has a departmental committee called Fachschaft, made up of students representing the interest of all the students. In Germany, Universities are scattered around the city, only very few have centralised campuses. The academic year is generally divided into two; the summer and winter semester. The summer semester typically starts from April to September, while the winter semester starts from October to March, but in the University of Applied Sciences this is a bit different, summer starts from March to August and winter semester from September to February.

In Germany, most Universities use the modules and credit points system. The module system is used for both bachelors and masters programmes. I was a bit confused when I started studying, since in Nigeria, we don't use the module. It was totally a new experience to me. Modules could take two semesters to complete and consist of six to ten hours of lecture a week.

To receive an academic degree, students must fulfill certain amount of points. Usually, it is demanded that students complete 180 to 240 credit points for a bachelor's degree and 60 to 120 credit points for a master's degree.



TIMELINE FOR PLANNING AND PREPARATION (BONUS)

As a bonus tip for you, I'm sharing a method I used in planning and preparing for my study and trip to study. Here is a breakdown of the process:

- Y At Least 1 Year Before Traveling To Germany: I started by gathering information about the study opportunities for me in Germany and if I meet the requirement for me to successfully be admitted by checking and confirming all the necessary documents needed for admission. I also had to figure out how I was going to finance my study.
- Ÿ 6 Months Before Travelling To Germany: By this time, I had already decided on a course of study and University and I also contacted the University's international office for further information about my course of study.
- ÿ **3-5 Months Before Your Study Starts:** Already submitted my application to the University for admission and making sure I paid attention to the deadline, whether winter or summer semester.
- ÿ What Next After Getting Admission Notification: I applied for an accommodation immediately I received my admission letter and applied for a visa as well as health insurance with a health insurance policy that is officially

REQUIREMENT FOR STUDENT VISA APPLICATION

First, you need to know there are different kind of visas. Once you get a notification of admission, then it is time for you to apply for a visa. Though, you may still apply for a visa even if you have not been granted an admission into a German University or Studienkolleg- this is the foundation programme I mentioned earlier but you'll only be able to apply for a study applicant visa (in German: Visum zum Zweck der Studienbewerbung). You must find out from the German embassy in your country, as this opportunity is not available in all countries. If you have been admitted to a University or Studienkolleg, you should apply for a student visa (in German: Visum für den Aufenthalt zu Studienzwecken). The visa you'll be given will only be valid for three months, so you'll have to apply for a residence permit at the foreign or immigration office in your city of residence when you arrive in Germany.



I GOT ADMISSION

Step 1 I Need A Student Visa

After getting my admission, the next thing was to apply for a student visa and because many African countries including Nigeria are not eligible to a visa-free entry into Germany. I had to apply for one. Pay Attention:

It is not advisable to enter Germany with a tourist visa, as you cannot convert a tourist visa to a student visa or student applicant visa in Germany. You'll still have to go back to your country to re-apply for a student visa. Once you're sure of the visa type you are applying for, the step is to make sure you have all the required documents ready before the slated date for interview. Here are documents I presented, and these are the general required documents. Although, in some countries some documents may not be required and in some more may be requested. You may have to confirm the necessary documents from the German embassy in your country before requesting for an interview date



STEP 2: ARRANGE VISA DOCUMENTS STUDENT VISA APPLICATION DOCUMENTS

- 1. Proof of finance
- 2. Previous academic certificates (including transcripts)
- 3. Proof of health insurance
- 4. German knowledge certificate or letter showing future German course in Germany
- 5. Admission letter from a German University or Higher Institution
- 6. Health certificate (Required for some countries)
- 7. University Entrance Qualification recognised in Germany (When applicable)

YES! I GOT MY VISA

After you get your visa, you must apply for accommodation, so you don't find it difficult when you arrive, as this could be difficult sometimes, depending on the city. Although It is usually more challenging with big cities, like Berlin, Hamburg, Cologne, Munich or Düsseldorf because of high demand. Kampus Konnekt49 sorted my accommodation before I arrived, you should contact them (link to appointment form). They support their students with securing accommodation before arrival, so you could focus more on settling in when you arrive your destination. Now you have secured your accommodation, then you can book your travel ticket.

I Got an ISIC Card

The International Student Identity Card (ISIC) is a student card that offers discounts for international students. The discounts could cover travel tickets, insurance and living expenses in more than 130 countries. I got my ISIC card with a registration fee of 22 euro. The card is available in some African countries.

You can apply online for it as well by submitting following documents:

- Digital photo
- Scanned copy of proof of full-time student status
- Scanned copy of proof of identity

1 MONTH BEFORE I LEFT MY COUNTRY

One month before I left Nigeria, I visited a doctor. I'll advise you to do same before moving to Germany to ensure you are in a good health shape, you can also ask the doctor if you need to get any vaccine or any medication for Germany. The doctor can prescribe medicines needed to take along that will help during your stay in Germany, especially if you're on any special health treatment. Make sure you're well acquainted with the health issues for travellers to Germany before you embark on your journey.

Start Packing Soon and Smart

Packing for study abroad could be very challenging, since you will be away for a long period and there are so many things needed to put carry along. I was focused more on making sure I had all my personal documents. If you forget any of these documents, it may ruin your study plans but for other items you can always buy them in Germany: Here is my list of important items:

- 1. Passport valid throughout your study stay in Germany
- 2. Admission letter from the University or School
- 3. Proof of financial resources
- 4. Original copies of all your academic or work document including translated certified copies (if applicable)
- 5. Language certificates (English and German; if applicable)
- 6. Proof of finance/funding
- 7. Health insurance confirmation
- 8. International driving license
- 9. Vaccination card (if applicable)
- 10. Other travel documents (air ticket, Travel health insurance, etc.)

11. Cash (change it from your local currency to euro) or

Step 2 ENROLLING AT MY UNIVERSITY

To fully get started at a University, you must matriculate, for you to be able to register for your courses, so you can get a degree upon completion of studies. These are the procedures I took to enroll at my University:

- 1. I visited the office of students' affairs "Studentensekretariat" and the international office and I was required to submit these documents for enrollment:
 - Ÿ Passport or ID Card,
 - Ÿ Admission Letter from the University
 - ÿ University Entrance Qualification (or substitute documents)
 - Ÿ Passport photos (up to 10 depending on the university or school)
 - Ÿ Health insurance coverage,
 - ÿ German Language proficiency proof (for study in German only)
 - Ÿ English Language proficiency proof (for study in English only),
 - Ÿ Proof of English and German language proficiency (for study in German and English)

After providing these documents, the international office gave me an enrollment certificate of enrollment, which served also as a temporary student ID.

You'll also be issued bank details on paying the semester contribution by at the international office or student affairs office. I received my student ID card after paying the semester fee.

After which, I was provided with an online account with login details to access the University's intranet services such as the electronic course information, online registration for courses and exams and online course material of professors.

At the beginning of each semester, you always have to re-register, because enrolment is only valid for one semester and to be enrolled in the following semester you will have to pay the semester fee, which is usually with a deadline.

Step 3

REGISTER AT THE CITY RESIDENCE OFFICE AND APPLY FOR A RESIDENCE PERMIT

It is necessary to register in your city of residence in Germany. So, to do this, I went to the local resident registration office. For some of my friends, who were living in larger cities, they went to the municipal office. These are the documents I needed to register at the resident registration office:


- 1. Passport or ID Card
- 2. Confirmation of residence from my landlord I was given a registration form to fill after which, I got a printout confirming I had registered.

Hint: Keep your registration confirmation safe, because you'll need in another city, if eventually you move.

I had to go to the foreigner's registration office after I finished my registration at the resident registration office. It is compulsory for every student, who is not a citizen of Germany or any of the EU countries to register at the foreigner's office, to have a legal stay in Germany. The registration isn't free, you must pay between 50 and 60 euros. These are the documents I presented at the time of my registration:

- 1. Residency registration confirmation from the resident registration office.
- 2. Health certificate (if applicable)
- 3. Proof of health insurance coverage
- 4. University enrolment confirmation
- 5. Passport
- 6. Proof of financial resources

I had all my document complete and valid, so I was given 1-year residence permit, which you could always extend if there's a need for it.



Step 4 OPENING A BANK ACCOUNT

To open a bank account as a student in Germany is quite simple. There are many banks that offer students special offers and services. To complete my account opening procedure was easy. All I did was fill an application form and submitted all the documents that were requested.

The documents usually requested are university admission letter, residence permit and sometimes a passport photo, depending on the bank. There's a possibility of opening an account online too, in a case, where you don't want to go to the bank physically.

Step 5 COST AND FINANCING

The first thing that came to my mind when I decided to study in Germany was how much it was going to cost me, considering my parents were not able to afford expensive education, by the time I realised there's was no tuition fee in many German public universities I couldn't wait to grab the opportunity. However, there were still some expenses that I had to still prepare for. To help you understand the financial cost of studying in Germany, I have broken it down for you accordingly:

Semester Contribution: Though you don't have to pay tuition, but it is compulsory to pay the semester fee, which differs from university to university, it ranges between 200 and 300 euros. This fee helps in financing some students' services and activities, which includes student halls of residence, dining halls, sport facilities and administration. The fee also includes the semester ticket needed for local and regional transportation within the state or city you are studying for six months.

Tuition Fee (If Applicable): As I told you before, many public universities in Germany are free and are funded by the government, however, there are some master's degree programmes that require you to pay for it and private universities charge a lot of money for those studying there, and the cost of tuition has nothing to do with the quality of education. Public universities in Germany offer quality education and very competitive global. Even though the tuition is free, you may still spend up to 49 euros if you process your admission through Uni-assist.

Living Costs: Compared to many other European countries, the cost of living in Germany is relatively cheap. It is difficult to predict how much one needs t for upkeep in Germany but on the average, you will need 900 euros monthly to survive but this depends on whether you live in a big city or small town. You will need less than 900 euros if you live in a small city.

Evidence of Finance: To study in Germany, you must prove you have up to 11,904 euros you can live or survive on for one year.

Before you leave your country, the German embassy will require you to show proof of finance when you apply for study visa, which can be through any of these means: payment of 11,904 euros into a blocked account in a bank in Germany as I mentioned before, an issue of guarantee by someone living in Germany called verpflichtungserklärung or a scholarship. To be sure of the type of financial proof required for your country, find out more from the German embassy in your country. If you don't have the means to fund your study just like me, there a lot of scholarship opportunities in Germany, the DAAD (German Academic Exchange Service). Step 6 CAN I FIND A JOB IN GERMANY AFTER MY STUDY?

There are lot of African students working in Germany currently. This is because international students have up to one year and 6 months after graduating to find a job. Although, the job must be related to the field of study. Graduates from German universities have great prospects in the German labor market, most especially graduates in the field of engineering, information technology, life sciences and mathematics.

You could decide to do a doctorate degree, if you were a master student or take up a master studies, if you were a bachelor's student, you also have an option of setting up your own business or enterprise. For you to live and work in Germany, you need to have long-term residency and as an international student, you are entitled to the following residence titles:


1. Residence permit (this is temporary residence permit you get for regular studies)

4. Permanent residency (permanent residence title)


















When You Arrive Germany

The Scholarship Guide at a Glance

When it comes to scholarship opportunities in Germany, there are numerous scholarship funding opportunities to choose from, depending on your study programme, academic qualification, professional qualification and German language proficiency. After acceptance in their desired study programme, all students can apply for a scholarship, for example at a foundation. Foundations that grant scholarships can be found https://www.stiftungsindex.de/ German and international students are eligible for Bundesausbildungsförderung (BAföG) under specified criteria. Germans with a bachelor's degree or international students who lived in Germany prior to their studies can be supported. See link https://www.studentenwerke.de/en/ for details. International students, researchers and academics can apply to many scholarship organisations, like the German Academic Exchange Service (DAAD), which is the largest and most recognised scholarship body in Germany as well as the largest scholarship organisation in the world, party-affiliated foundations, business-affiliated institutions and university scholarships. The guide will give you a detailed overview of many scholarship granting bodies and opportunities for international students to study in Germany.

Preface

Scholarships in Germany are mostly available only for Masters and PhD candidates, especially for international applicants. Therefore, this ebook will mainly focus on providing information for postgraduate courses and scholarships.



Scholarships for Postgraduate Courses

General Information

International applicants applying for a scholarship in Germany for a postgraduate programme should have obtained a recognised Master's or PhD degree in their home country or anywhere else in the world.





Usually 12-24 months for Masters (but this depends on the particular institution) and 36 months for PhD. For your scholarship to be effective, it is required that you must have already gained an admission into a German University or University of Applied Sciences. Scholarships are also available for various study programmes based on what you want to study and sometimes the scholarship fund could include an all expense paid German language course. However, students who can finance their study themselves or depend on their government support or other sources still get admitted to study as well.

Prerequisites and Requirements

General Requirement For Postgraduate Scholarship Applications



Professional Qualification

At the time of application, all applicants must show documentation of at least two years of professional job experience and identify their current employment condition. The following proof must be submitted: a letter of reference from the employer(s), ideally guaranteeing re-employment after completion of the study in Germany; a certificate(s) of employment that include the exact position and period of employment; a letter of recommendation from the employer(s), ideally guaranteeing re-employment after completion of the study in Germany.



Academic Qualification

All applicants must hold a Bachelor's degree (normally four years) in a related subject of their intended study and must have completed the academic degree with far above average results (upper third) and at least two years of related professional experience after the first degree (bachelor) at the time of application. The academic degree should not be more than six years old under normal circumstances.



Language Qualification

German

For study courses in German (scholarship includes a preparatory 6-month German language course in Germany for some scholarships, especially DAAD scholarships.) Successfully passing the language examination TestDaF 4 or DSH 2 may also be a requirement for some scholarships in Germany. TestDaF or DSH 2 are examinations that confirm the language skills needed for admission to enrol in all degree programmes and courses at all German universities. Therefore a minimum German language level of B1 at the time of application is a requirement that needs to be proofed by providing a certificate in some other cases. It is not possible to pass the required German language courses (DSH 2 or TestDaF) without any previous basic knowledge in the German language (at least B1 Level). Passing the language test is a formal prerequisite for matriculation at the respective German university.

English

For courses in English: IELTS (Band 6) certificate or TOEFL (minimum score: 550 paper based, 213 computer based, 80 internet based) are the required standard in some cases for a scholarship in Germany.



Statement of Motivation

Applicants are usually required to submit a statement of motivation explaining why they are interested in attending a particular postgraduate course with reference to their current employment. They are usually also asked to describe their development-related motivation and how they intend to make full use of their scholarship and education by taking on social responsibility later in their careers.



How The Scholarship Selection Is Made

An independent and voluntary committee mostly made up of German university lecturers, researchers and teachers selects applicants. Personal introduction may be required depending on the study programme of the applicant, if it is a two level selection, another independent committee of academics will then be set up for this.

The main criteria for selection are the project's quality, whether it is for study or research or continuing education and a solid letter of motivation. In addition to project quality, the individual's academic achievements play a major role as well as language skills, although this depends on the scholarship programme.

Always ensure to check their websites for the application process and deadlines and the required documents to be submitted. If you send your applications to the DAAD in such a situation, your application will remain with DAAD as they don't forward the applications to the institutions concerned nor will they return it.

The most commonly awarded DAAD scholarships to international applicants from developing countries is the so-called EPOS scholarship, which is focused on development-related postgraduate study programmes.

DAAD sponsors a carefully determined range of postgraduate courses of particular relevance to junior executives from developing countries from among the enormous number of postgraduate courses provided by German institutions of higher education.

Selection Procedure and Requirement for the DAAD EPOS Scholarship

Candidates must demonstrate development-related motivation and are expected to make the most of their scholarship and education later in their careers by taking on social responsibility and acting as change agents who stimulate and support development in their personal and professional environments (motivation, commitment to development) in their home countries.

The candidates must possess the professional and academic qualifications required for successful completion of the degree program in Germany (final test scores, language skills, etc).

Frequently Asked Questions About the DAAD EPOS Scholarship Programme:

1. Should I send my applications directly to DAAD?

No, you must apply directly to the course! For information on the application process (e.g., online application), the application deadline, and the documents that must be provided, you have to visit the course provider's websites for this. Applications sent to the DAAD by e-mail or through the DAAD website will be ignored during the selection process.

2. Can I apply for more than one course at a time?

Yes, you can apply for up to three courses at a time, usually you will have to list your courses in order of importance in your application forms, indicating your host institution/university in Germany.

N.B Without the official DAAD application form, scholarships cannot be provided.

3. What are the application deadlines for DAAD scholarships?

The deadlines varies depending on universities or courses

4. Does the scholarship cover my living expenses in Germany?

DAAD scholarship covers living expenses, health insurance and in some cases language training for the entirety of the postgraduate program.

5. Who decides if I get an admission?

After reviewing the application materials of your postgraduate programme, an admission committee consisting of German university professors and academics decide on the admission based on all criteria.

6. How long is the application duration for a DAAD scholarship?

In most situations, the application process for a DAAD scholarship takes a year. You can apply even if you haven't finished your education in your home country.

7. How much do I receive from DAAD as support?

A monthly scholarship support of 861 Euro for graduates and 1,200 Euro for doctoral/PhD students is paid and a flat-rate travel allowance is frequently included. Health, accident, and personal liability insurance are in some cases provided as well.

N.B: All postgraduate courses featured in this guide have a selection procedure that runs from the end of October to the beginning of March.

The Deutschlandstipendium

General Information

The Deutschlandstipendium supports high-achieving and dedicated students from all over the world financially and non-materially. Businesses, foundations, or private individuals fund young talent with a monthly contribution of 150 Euros, modeled after the public-private partnership approach. The German government adds another 150 Euros to the total, bringing the total to 300 Euros. In 2020, the Deutschlandstipendium benefited 28.100 students.

Eligibility Requirement

The Deutschlandstipendium is awarded by universities in Germany. Applicants must meet the requirements of the individual institutions. In addition to academic achievement, the criteria for selecting scholarship recipients include social commitment and personal achievements, such as a student overcoming challenges or obstacles in his or her social or family background.

More and more institutions of higher education and private sponsors are offering additional non-financial support in connection with the Deutschlandstipendium. Mentoring programmes, networking events and internships allow scholarship holders to establish valuable contacts to businesses and gain insight into work life. Deadlines

You can apply for the support at the beginning of every study semester. Funding is usually provided for at least two semesters, but it might be for as long as the conventional length of study.

Application Procedure

The Deutschlandstipendium is designed to help students who are gifted and capable. School and academic achievements are essential benchmarks for evaluating applicants' performance and talent.

Awards and honors, past jobs and internships, extracurricular or extracurricular activity, and overcoming any biographical difficulties relating to origin are all part of the financing criterion. The applicant's full personality should be considered during the application and selection process.

The scholarship is granted mostly to Muslim graduates, students, and doctorate candidates. The Evangelische Studienwerk Villigst is the gifted support agency of Germany's Protestant churches, now supporting roughly 1200 students of all fields and 200 PhD candidates.

Eligibility Requirement

You must be a citizen of an EU member state, a Swiss national, or you qualify for funding under 8 BAföG.

You must be a member of a Protestant church. If you are not, you could still apply. In this instance, after receiving your application, an admissions committee will review your letter of motivation and application and decide whether or not you will be admitted to the preselect program.

Letter of motivation, this will contribute to determine whether or not you are accepted.

You can demonstrate your voluntary commitment (for example, in church, politics, society, etc.) or dedication to the family and/or the social surroundings (for example, translation work, visits to authorities, care, support, etc.) as well as your professional aptitude to prove the (planned) route.

You have or will earn a valid university entry qualification in the near future (e.g. the technical or general university entrance qualification).

A full-time, face-to-face course at a state or state-recognized university is your (scheduled) course. Part-time, remote learning, dual or training-integrated courses are not supported.

The following rules are also applicable:

If you are over the age of 35, you have to submit a special application in PDF. More info here.

Applicants without German citizenship must demonstrate level C1 German language skills (recognized: Abitur or advanced technical college entrance qualification (acquired at a German school), DSH 2 and higher, Goethe certificate C1 / C2, test DaF (at least 4/5), Telc C1 Hochschule, UNICert III, assessment test with at least a sufficient final grade in German).

If you are enrolled in two or more courses (dual or parallel), you can only be supported for one of them, and you must apply for funding for the course that you started first. The number of semesters of the subject or course of study that was begun first is used to calculate the financing term. The study of a major subject with lesser subjects is exempt from this rule.

Deadlines

The Friedrich Ebert Foundation is a non-profit organization affiliated to the SPD political party in Germany. They assist young and ambitious people who want to work for a more just society, as defined by social democracy.

Eligibility Requirement

Students from Germany and, under certain circumstances, foreign students (Bildungsinländer/innen) are supported: Their academic achievements have to be above average.

Applicants have to be involved in socio-political involvement (e.g., head boy/girl, student council, youth work, participation in associations and non-governmental organizations that align with the Friedrich-Ebert Stiftung's political goals) Very good German language skills

The scholarship program can accept up to 40 students from Africa, Asia, Latin America, and Eastern Europe.

Deadlines

There are no deadlines for submitting your application. Any time is a good time to apply. A common rule is to submit your application as soon as feasible.

Application Procedure

There are four steps leading to funding you:

Step 1: Simply fill out the <u>online</u> application here. You will be asked a few questions about your professional and family background, no further documents are required for this.

First-year students (not master's students) in their first semester will have to submit two reports from former teachers or lecturers.

Upon FES request, you have three weeks to upload the documents. Six weeks for the expert opinion, if necessary after consultation with FES. It is better for you to put the documents together while you are waiting for their response.

Scholarship recipients can get up to 744 Euro per month; the amount is similar to BAföG and is dependent on a variety of factors, including the parents' income. A monthly flat-rate study fee of 300 Euro is also available to all scholarship holders.

A contribution to health insurance of up to 71 euros and long-term care insurance of up to 15 euros is made monthly, depending on the applicant's condition. A monthly family payment of 155 euros is available to scholarship holders with children. The scholarship is not reimbursed.

FES strongly encourages stays abroad during the funding term, particularly for study or research stays, language courses, and internships lasting up to twelve months, through travel grants, tuition costs, and international health insurance.

Support for International Masters and Bachelors Candidates

Foreign scholarship recipients earn 830 Euro per month (Bachelor / Diplom / Magister / State Examination) or 850 Euro per month (Master's) plus health insurance charges. For scholarship holders with children, a 276 Euro family allowance is provided. Scholars are not expected to pay back the scholarship.

After the Application, What Happens Next?

Pre-selection is made from among the applications received for the promotion of studies and the promotion of young journalists based on the complete application materials. Based on applications received, candidates are then selected on the selection committee's standard.

What occurs at the interview?

Retreats

A ten-question survey is used to determine your general education status. This is followed by an essay on a relevant issue. You have five options to pick from. In this essay, it is critical to create your own point of view while also dealing constructively with the subject and various viewpoints.

Discussion in a Group

The group discussion is planned in the style of a talk show, focusing on current political themes. You should offer your expertise, your point of view from various angles, and your own point of view to a politically motivated audience on a certain topic.

You will read contributions that will be made available to you on site to prepare for the imaginary broadcast, and you will collaborate on a combined analysis of the current situation before the "broadcast." Each group offers its analysis at the start of the talk show, contributing to a shared level of understanding among all participants and (fictitious) spectators.

One-on-One Consultation

All selection sessions will be replaced by individually arranged online one-on-one interviews as long as the corona epidemic imposes limits.

The selection meeting comes to a close with a one-on-one interview. You will have the opportunity to speak with the examiners and introduce yourself.

Individual test groups are used by our selection committee. Each review group is made up of three people:

A science representative, usually a professor as committee head, as well as two members who are exceptionally qualified for selection in the relevant applicant group according to their professional skills.

Scholarship Duration

Oskar Karl Forster Scholarship for Books and Learning Materials

General Information

The state of Bavaria administers this scholarship fund on behalf of the late Consul Oskar Karl Forster, and it is made available through the TUM.

Students with German university admission credentials and students with non-German university entry certificates who are eligible for BAföG assistance can get financial aid for books and learning materials.

Eligibility Requirement

TUM undergraduate and graduate students who have completed at least two semesters at TUM are eligible.

TUM grade report (may be acquired from TUMonline) must be handed in.

Low income (evidence of need): Academically exceptional or students proving financial need who have completed at least two semesters at TUM.

All students who receive financial aid under the BAföG Act are presumed to be in need. If not, the applicant's parents and income will be examined, and they must be less than 200 percent of the allowance, as per Section 1 BAföG. This amount lowers as the applicant's income rises.

There has been no previous financial aid from the Oskar Karl Forster scholarship fund.

Erasmus Mundus Joint Masters Scholarships

General Information

Erasmus Mundus Joint Masters are master's level integrated study programs. An international cooperation of higher education institutions from around the world designs and delivers the programs.

Erasmus+ provides scholarships to students who want to participate in these programs. In annual application rounds, masters programs provide these grants to the top-ranked student applicants from around the world.

Eligibility Requirement

60, 90, or 120 ECTS credits are available in Erasmus Mundus joint masters programs. This means the duration is anywhere from a year to a year and a half. The majority of the programs last 24 months.

Your research must include at least two study periods in two separate nations (different from your country of residence). Different study tracks are available in programs that meet this requirement.

Deadlines

October and January, for study courses starting the following year.

Application Procedure

To begin, you have to look through the Erasmus Mundus Master's Program Catalogue <u>here</u>. The webpage has all the information you need for each programme about the curriculum, entry requirements, and colleges so you can decide if this is the perfect program for you.

This <u>website</u> for the programme will also walk you through each stage of the online application procedure. Every summer, a new batch of selected Erasmus Mundus Masters is added to the list.

Scholarship Value

The scholarship usually includes the student's programme participation, airfare, and stipend for living expenses. The scholarship amounts between 150 and 390 or more, depending on the country group.

When You Arrive Germany

If you are new in Germany, it may be difficult to figure out the things you need to do in order to settle fast and conveniently.

Here are some of the things you need to do when you newly arrive in Germany:

Put your name on your door bell as you will need this for all letters and correspondences.

You have to register within two weeks of arrival at the "Bürgeramt."

You have to open a bank account after you have registered at the Bürgeramt as you will need this document alongside your passport or ID card for bank account opening.

You need to get yourself a SIM card for communication. A prepaid or a postpaid phone plan is available for you. The main providers in Germany include Vodafone, O2, T-Mobile, Base, and others.
